EARTH DAY 2025

For the first time, Eltham Church of England will be joining the celebrations for **Earth Day on Friday 25th April 2025**. Running since the 1970s and now in its 55th year, Earth Day allows individuals and organisations to demonstrate their support for environmental protection.

How will we be marking Earth Day?

On Friday 25th April, children will be invited to come to school dressed as something from the natural world. Subject to good weather, parents and carers will be invited to stay for our Earth Day Parade which will be held in the KS2 playground, starting at 9.10am.

Children will be invited to make **a voluntary donation of £1** which we will direct to the charity **Just One Tree.** For every £1 donation, they will plant a tree in an area of the world suffering from deforestation.

In support of the 2025 theme of '**Our power, Our planet**', we will be **learning electricityfree** for the day, exploiting our outdoor environments in school and in the locality. This will include time in our Edible Playground sowing sprint seeds and plants.

Children will be exploring a number of environment themes and developing our **Eco code** under the guidance of our **Eco Committee**.

SPOTLIGHT IN STEM IN UPPER KEY STAGE 2

We are thrilled to share an update on STEM in Years 5 and 6, as there has been so much going on. This term has been packed with engaging activities, fascinating discoveries and inspiring projects. Let's dive into the highlights!

Cambridge Science Centre

We were delighted to welcome in the Cambridge Science Centre for a 'Challenge Day'. Our budding scientists had a fantastic time in the day-long workshop, developed by the pharmaceutical company Roche, where they had to develop vaccinations for a hypothetical disease. Students worked through various activities, starting with identifying reliable sources and discarding unreliable ones. They then produced a description of the disease symptoms and worked to understand its spread. The next stage was to carry out a practical to mimic the drug formulation process and finally, to use clinical trials data to identify which treatment should be given to which patients.

Gifted and Talented

"The opportunity to visit this STEM school and Ravensbourne University was an experience I won't ever forget."

One of our Year 5 students, Jack, had the incredible opportunity to participate in a prestigious gifted and talented event organized by a local university. Jack was selected based on his outstanding performance in STEM subjects. The event brought together young minds from various schools to engage in advanced workshops, interactive talks, and hands-on experiments. Jack particularly enjoyed the engineering session, where he collaborated with university professors and students to build and develop a park. This experience not only enriched Jack's knowledge but also inspired him to pursue further studies in STEM fields. We are immensely proud of his achievements and look forward to seeing more students shine in such events.

CREST Discovery Award

Children from across upper key stage 2 attended the CREST Discovery Awards which offer an introduction to real project work and give students the freedom to run their own investigations. With minimal adult intervention, children worked in groups to solve a STEM challenge, and then present their work. The children chose to design a tool for the home, landing on a home security system with facial-recognition and other helpful features. It was great to see children combine their imagination with their knowledge of materials and engineering acquired in Science and DT lessons.

Christ Hospital Maths Competition

Christ's Hospital School recently hosted its bi-annual Maths Challenge for Year 5 children. At the historic Guildhall in London, 236 enthusiastic mathematicians, including 4 of our Year 5s, had the opportunity to test their problem solving abilities and mathematical knowledge with a series of challenging tasks and puzzles in a fun, interactive environment. Student helpers from Christ's Hospital provided guidance and support throughout the event, creating an encouraging atmosphere for all the children who took part.

ATTENDANCE FOR SPRING 2 TERM

At Eltham Church of England Primary School we continue to promote and celebrate good attendance and punctuality. Not only is good attendance beneficial to pupils' achievements it is also an excellent 'life skill'.

We use the Royal Borough of Greenwich's Attendance Advisory Service to monitor and support our management of pupil attendance. Under Fast Track, families will be informed when their child's attendance has crossed the threshold, even when all absences have been correctly documented and understood. If a child's attendance continues to decline and gives the Attendance Advisory Officer a cause for concern, then a meeting between the school, the parents and the advisory service is convened.

The school's target is to ensure that whole school attendance is consistently above 97% and better still above 97.5%

Can we remind parents that all absences and appointments need to be supported with a written letter, or appointment card, outlining the reason for the absence as soon as your child returns to school. Also, that **all** holiday will be recorded as unauthorised, however a child's overall attendance will be taken into account when consideration is given to the Fast Track procedures.

It has been another busy term for all learners of French as children have engaged in speaking activities, surveys, stories and listening and reading skills. Year 2 are becoming quite proficient now at carrying out surveys to discover what their friends like or dislike about things - our latest survey was about vegetables which they certainly all had an opinion on! Year 3 had great fun learning about French Easter traditions as they worked in groups to travel around the school to find all the numbered eggs so they could answer all their quiz questions. They showed great teamwork - well done Year 3! Year 4 finished the Sleeping Beauty story and produced some wonderful writing for classroom displays about their daily routines. Year 5 focused on listening skills, word order of adjectives and comparative language as they learnt about the planets. They were fascinated by the link to French days of the week! Year 6 have been expressing opinions about their leisure time, incorporating their prior learning in their final big writing task. Their focus and enthusiasm continue to amaze me. I look forward to seeing how all language learners progress over the summer term.

WHAT'S NEW FROM HOPE CLASS



UNDER THE SEA and DINOSAURS

It has been another fun packed term in Hope class this spring. The children have continued to gain confidence and learn about playing and working together. We love to sing songs which remind us we are all friends in Nursery and listen to stories about sharing and taking turns.

Before half term, our topic was 'Under The Sea'. As part of our studies, we looked at different sea creatures and wrote a class book about them. We learnt lots of interesting facts: Did you know that an octopus has three hearts? We also made aquariums out of shoe boxes and added tissue paper, seaweed and pebbles to make them look more realistic. We celebrated the end of the topic by having an 'Under the Sea' party where we dressed up and made sea creature masks.

Since coming back after half term, we have been studying dinosaurs. We have learnt about herbivores and carnivores, and how their teeth are different shapes. We transformed the role play area into 'Dinosaur Den' where the plastic dinosaurs have roamed freely and we have hunted for fossils. We have experimented making dinosaurs from junk, and designed our own dinosaurs in clay, adding art straws and beads to represent horns and armour-plating.

In Maths, we have been busy with the balance scales comparing the weight of different sea creatures and dinosaurs. We have also learnt how to program the Beebot to follow a route across the floor and played lots of counting games including our favourite, 'Capture 4' (similar to Connect Four).

Back in January, we started to learn our letter sounds. Each week, we study a different letter and learn what sound the letter makes, and how to write it correctly. We love using our robot arms and blending hands to sound out simple words.

One of the best days of the term was Pancake Day, when we got to make and eat pancakes sprinkled with sugar and lemon. Another fun day was World Book Day - the children all looked amazing and loved going up to Year 6 to share books with the older children. Our repertoire of songs has continued to increase and now includes 'I'm a Little Puffa Train', 'The Big Dinosaurs go Stomp, Stomp, Stomp' and 'I've Got Something Very Special'. In the last week of term, we learnt all about Easter and made some yummy chocolate cakes - delicious!

WHAT'S NEW FROM RECEPTION



SPRING TERM

What a fun-packed term! The children have really enjoyed the topics this term and this is reflected in the progress they are all making. We are so proud of them!

We continue with the daily phonics lesson and we are pleased with how many children are now applying their phonics to blend when reading. We are also reading decodable books as a class. This is a great way to develop their comprehension and predicting skills, as we ask lots of questions about the story as we read aloud.

In mathematics, we have been consolidating our number skills and understanding subitising, the ability to look at a small number of objects and instantly recognising how many objects there are without needing to count. The children have also developed their understanding of measures, using the water tray, playing with rulers and using the balance scales.

Our themed teaching this term was 'Where in the World?' and 'Superheroes'. We have read some wonderful texts including Avocado Baby, The Tiger Who Came To Tea, Biscuit Bear and Charlie's Superhero Underpants. The children have completed a wide variety of activities based on these texts, for example, designing and making a biscuit, tasting an avocado, making toast, painting a tiger, and writing a letter as Charlie to get their underpants back! We love that the children tackled all these activities with great enthusiasm and appeared to have so much fun.

Other special events that have taken place this term include a visit from Reverend Caroline, The Art Award and World Book Day. Reverend Caroline visited us as part of our RE work leading to Easter. She discussed the meaning of the palms for Palm Sunday and all the children were given a palm. The children had a great time dressed as their favourite book characters for World Book Day with all the EYFS team joining in. A stand out was Mrs Griffiths dressed as a giant snail. For the Art Award, Mrs H Hayes planned a fantastic week of art activities. Our focused artist was Yayoi Kusama. North and Corbett class created sea turtles using a wide range of skills such as colour mixing, wet on wet painting and Aboriginal style dot painting. They were all so pleased with their finished turtles, which are currently being displayed in the main school corridors.

WHAT'S NEW FROM YEAR 1



YEAR 1

We have had a very busy term in Year 1. We have worked hard this term on our independence, now we are familiar with the structure of Year 1 and have been doing most activities now as a whole class.

We have enjoyed reading the story 'Katie in London' and 'Katie in Scotland'. We wrote our own adventure story 'Katie in Eltham' where Katie and Nessie went exploring around Eltham. We visited Eltham Park South and the train station to help us write these. In Maths, we have been applying our knowledge of addition and subtraction to numbers to 50, and are becoming increasingly confident with these.

Over the past few weeks we have enjoyed our measuring units, including using rulers and measuring in CMs, using balance scales for weight, and measuring water for our capacity lessons using language of full, empty and half full.

We have enjoyed learning about Judaism in RE including the different festivals which are important to Jewish people. We looked at some of the traditions Jewish people do in these festivals, including trying some apple covered in honey.

In DT, we have learnt how to thread a needle and how to do a running stitch. We practised doing this on different materials and then created our own pillow for our tooth to keep it safe for the tooth fairy. These look amazing and we are looking forward to taking these home soon and being able to use them!

We have also enjoyed our tennis lessons with Valentina this half term. We have some future tennis players in the making.

In Art, we've been exploring the works of artist Alberto Giacometti. The children have shown great enthusiasm in studying his special use of colours and his fascinating sculptures. The highlight of the unit was when the children created their own pieces of art using complementary colours, they looked so effective!

In PE, the children have been working hard on their cricket and rounders skills. We have been particularly impressed with their dedication to practicing their throwing and catching techniques. Their teamwork and sportsmanship have really shone through, and we are excited to see how they continue to develop in the future!

WHAT'S NEW FROM YEAR 5



YEAR 5

Year 5 have shown great resilience and determination towards all of their learning throughout the Spring Term. We had our trip to Southwark Cathedral where the children learnt about Christian symbols, had a tour of the Cathedral and created their very own candles. We also recently took part in our Charity Big Spring Sing to show our support for our chosen charity for the year, Christian Aid. The children were very well behaved and sang beautifully! Thank you to the parents who gave a donation and also to the parent helpers.

In DT this half term, we did our systems unit with the question 'How can we keep safe on the roads?'. The children worked in groups to create a bike safety belt. They designed it, made a prototype and then created a bike light using the micro: bits. The children also had the opportunity to present their ideas. There were some incredible creations – perfect for Dragon's Den! We also discussed the British inventor, Emily Brooke (MBE), who invented the Beryl bike light projector.

We finished our Ancient Greek Unit in History and have now moved on to looking at the Maya Civilisation and how this compares to the Anglo Saxons. The children completed their Map skills – 4 and 6 figure grid references - in Geography and will be moving on to Ordnance Survey (OS) map and field work unit in the summer.

We have lots to look forward to in the Summer term, including Sports Day, a geography-based school trip, a 2-mile run in the park amongst many more exciting activities so watch this space!

Well done again to all of Year 5 for their super efforts this term and we hope you all have a wonderful Easter break.

WHAT'S NEW FROM YEAR 6





YEAR 6

In Maths, we have been learning how to: convert between fractions, decimals and percentages using different methods; find percentages of amounts; and solve the more challenging reasoning and problem-solving style questions. Our writing sessions have consisted of practising using the passive voice, the impersonal tone, modal verbs, the subjunctive, language of debate and formal vocabulary. This was to prepare us for subsequently producing our next extended piece of writing: a formal, balanced argument on the benefits of both homeschool and public school. The children's writing has been incredible - WOW!

In Geography, Year 6 have been learning about settlements, including the different types of settlements that exist and their patterns.
