There have been so many 'best moments', too many for me to count, but what really sticks out is the personal 'thank you's I get from the children for giving them the opportunities to experience exciting events we put on in school and the trips we pay for to send them go theatres and other extra-curricular activities.

Worst PTA moment?

Standing out in the rain trying to get volunteers for our events. Only joking! I don't think I've ever had a worst moment.

Greatest PTA achievement?

ATTENDANCE FOR SUMMER 2 TERM

At Eltham Church of England Primary School we continue to promote and celebrate good attendance and punctuality. Not only is good attendance beneficial to pupils' achievements, it is also an excellent 'life skill'.

We use the Royal Borough of Greenwich's Attendance Advisory Service to monitor and support our management of pupil attendance.

Under Fast Track, families will be informed when their child's attendance has crossed the threshold, even when all absences have been correctly documented and understood. If a child's attendance continues to decline and gives the Attendance Advisory Officer a cause for concern, then a meeting between the school, the parents and the advisory service is convened.

The school's target is to ensure that whole school attendance is consistently above 97% and better still above 97.5%

Can we remind parents that all absences and appointments need to be supported with a written letter, or appointment card, outlining the reason for the absence as soon as your child returns to school. Also, that **all** holiday will be recorded as unauthorised, however a child's overall attendance will be taken into account when consideration is given to the Fast Track procedures.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

In September, every year group will be teaching from a new RE syllabus which has been developed by Southwark Diocese. Each year group looks at detail into Christianity and one other world faith (each year group covers a different world faith). The syllabus splits the units into lenses. These are believing, living and thinking. This allows the children to get a deep understanding of religious and non-religious views, (believing lens), understand how people live their lives based on these views (living lens) and allows the children to reflect on what they have learnt to their own lives (thinking lens). This year, some year groups have been diving into some parts of it to help transition into the new syllabus. Here are some photos of some of the learning we have done this year. WHAT'S NEW FROM FRENCH



FRENCH

We have had an extra special activity to round off this year's learning in French in Year 5. Both classes joined a video call with a school in Leverkusen, Germany (a school we have connected with before). The children asked and answered questions about their favourite things and got to hear how the school day in German primary schools is so different to the UK. If Year 5 children were in Germany now, they would be heading off to secondary school in September as they start a year earlier. Year 2 have been getting to grips with their pronunciation skills and are recognising the regular phonics differences. Year 3 explored house building in the style of the 3 Little Pigs and went on to be able to describe different body parts. Year 4 wrote wonderful descriptions of their families and took them home to share what they had written. And Year 6, what can I say, except that it has been an absolute pleasure teaching this wonderful group of children for the last five years. Their enthusiasm for learning has meant I have continually adapted my lesson plans to keep pace with what they want to learn - what a super problem to have! I wish every child all the very best of luck in their new schools and with their future language and cultural learning journeys. WHAT'S NEW FROM HOPE CLASS



BUGS AND BUDS, AND FAIRYTALES

We have had the most exciting term in Hope class.

After Easter, we started learning all about how living things live and grow. We learnt that plants have flowers, leaves, stems and roots. In the Edible Playground, we put our learning into practice by watering all the vegetables growing there. Usually, we remembered to water the roots not the leaves! We also watched our class caterpillars grow. We named the caterpillars Mufasa, Dojo, Nala, Topsy and Tiny Tim. Sadly, Tiny Tim died but the other 4 caterpillars spun chrysalises and turned into butterflies and we released them into the Edible Playground. A few weeks later, we noticed tiny eggs on the underside of leaves and wondered if our butterflies have had babies. We continued our book writing exploits with a book we named 'Big and Small Bugs'. We also enjoyed learning all about different creepy crawlies when the 'Wiggly Wild Show' visited our school. In maths, we continued practising our counting to 10, and counting bugs in our outdoor provision.

After half term, our topic was fairy tales. We started off reading the story of The Three Little Pigs. We acted out the story and joined in with the wolf's refrain "then I'll huff and I'll puff and I'll blow your house down". Then we transformed our role play area into the three little pigs houses. In weeks 3 and 4, we read the story of The Gingerbread Man and compared it to 'The Runaway Chapati'. Lastly, we focused on The Three Billy Goats Gruff, we acted out the story and made goats out of Numicon.

In our phonics sessions, we have continued learning our letter sounds and practised writing them every week. Mrs Masterson has been amazed at how many sounds we can remember. In the penultimate week, we learnt the sound 'qu' and Quarrelsome Queen made an impromptu visit. In maths, we counted and graphed the batteries we brought in for 'The Big Battery Hunt'. We didn't win but we did collect 356 batteries! In the last week of term, we had a Fairytale Ball and played party games with all our nursery friends - a fitting finale to a truly magical year.

SUMMER TERM

Wow! We can't believe we've reached the end of the year already. It has been a truly fabulous time with your children, and we are incredibly proud of each and every one of them.

Throughout the summer term, we continued with our daily phonics lessons, and every child has made noticeable progress. It's been so rewarding to hear them reading confidently and applying their phonics knowledge to decode new words—what an achievement!

In mathematics, we've been developing our number skills, including recognising numbers up to 30 and beyond. The children have also been practising number bonds, as well as addition and subtraction. They particularly enjoyed our lessons on shapes and patterns—important mathematical concepts that they explored with great enthusiasm.

Our themed learning this term included Growing and Animals, Tell Us a Story, and Dinosaurs. Unsurprisingly, the dinosaur activities were a big hit! The children engaged in fantastic imaginative play and created wonderful dinosaur collages featuring their own faces. They even came up with creative dinosaur names—such brilliant ideas!

We also spent time exploring the garden, hunting for minibeasts and observing the growth of plants. One of the highlights was watching caterpillars transform into butterflies. It was a joy to witness the children's awe and wonder during this magical process.

This term also included some special events. We visited St John's Church to help Reverend Caroline with a clean-up, and she later visited us at school to support our learning about The Creation. As part of the Reading Festival, the children enjoyed The Owl and the Pussycat Workshop. The Wiggly Worm Workshop, introduced the children to a wide range of fascinating minibeasts. Another memorable moment was our Teddy Bear's Picnic, even with the rain shower. The children loved taking part in races and playing with their friends on the playground. As teachers, we thoroughly enjoyed watching their interactions, and we'd like to extend a big thank you to all the amazing parents who supported the event.

It has been an absolute pleasure teaching North and Corbett this year. We are confident they will continue to grow and thrive in Year 1.
